Objectives and meeting structure

The objective of the meeting is to involve demographers and population scientists in ongoing discussions on the data revolution and the Post-2015 Development Agenda in order to ensure that their expertise and insights are better represented in those discussions. The William and Flora Hewlett Foundation has provided support to the IUSSP to mobilize the global community of demographers and populations scientists on this issue. This first meeting is organized in collaboration with the Population Association of America (PAA).
