INED will be hiring two tenured researchers in 2021.

The French Institute for Demographic Studies is a public research institute. Its missions include conducting cutting-edge research in all fields relating to demography and population studies, training junior researchers, and informing the public of its research activities. Thanks to its ten research units, INED encourages exchanges between disciplines and conducts a world- class research programme.

Context

This work involves a wide variety of approaches (demography, sociology, economics, history, geography, medicine, epidemiology, statistics, anthropology, etc.).

Over the next few years, INED's research plan (see link to website - https://www.ined.fr/en/institute/who-are-we/reference-documents/) covers the following major themes and sub-themes:

- Ages of life: childhood, education and transition to adulthood; conjugality and fertility; parenthood and family; gender and sexuality; life trajectories, socio-economic inequality and mobility; living conditions at advanced age.
- Population health: inequality and disparities; longevity; epidemiological transition in the Global North and South; health and sexual and reproductive rights.
- Space, mobility and migration: housing; mobility and territorial dynamics; migrants' life trajectories; inequality, discrimination and racism.
- Crises and populations: population groups and environment; consequences of health crises; political and socio-economic upheavals and demographic trends.

This research makes us of an extensive range of data: surveys, archives, administrative data, company data, geographical and remote-sensing data, Big Data, etc. These cover France and other countries, especially for international comparisons. INED also has a long tradition of research on the Global South. Historical research has a major place in INED's work. Much of our research also examines interactions between stakeholders and public policy.

Job description

The successful applicant will enjoy permanent researcher status. They will define their research within the framework of the unit or units they are affiliated to. They will contribute to activities for promoting and managing research. They will also contribute to training for research through research.

Qualifications

The applicant will have a PhD in a discipline relevant for population studies (demography, sociology, economics, history, geography, anthropology, epidemiology, medicine, statistics, etc.) and expertise in quantitative techniques applied to social sciences.

Desired experience

A range of experiences (working within different research units or institutes, teaching, experience abroad, survey work, organizing research events, etc.) will be appreciated, as well as an openness to interdisciplinary work and to multi-method approaches (for example, quantitative and qualitative techniques).
