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Overview and Highlights of 2025

The year 2025 was a landmark year for the International Union for the Scientific Study of Population (IUSSP). It was marked by major international recognition with the receipt of the United Nations' Population award, the successful organisation of the 30th International Population Conference (IPC2025) in Brisbane, important governance milestones including the General Assembly and Council elections. Together, these achievements reaffirmed IUSSP's global leadership in advancing population science and strengthening international collaboration at a time of rapidly evolving demographic challenges.

International Recognition: 2025 United Nations Population Award

In July 2025, IUSSP was honoured with the 2025 United Nations Population Award (Institutional Category) at a ceremony held at UN Headquarters in New York. In presenting the Award, UNFPA Executive Director Dr. Natalia Kanem described IUSSP as a global leader in advancing the scientific study of population since its founding in 1928 and highlighted the Union's long-standing role in building international research networks, strengthening demographic capacity, and supporting collaboration among researchers and policy makers.

Accepting the Award on behalf of IUSSP, President-elect Laura Rodriguez Wong emphasized the Union's historic contributions to demographic research and its continuing commitment to strengthening data systems and addressing key global challenges—including fertility decline, ageing, migration, and the demographic dimensions of climate change—while ensuring that demographic evidence informs policy and practice, particularly in the Global South.

International Population Conference 2025 (IPC2025)

IPC2025: A Global Reunion in Brisbane

The 30th International Population Conference (IPC2025) was held in Brisbane, Australia, from 13 to 18 July 2025. This was the first in-person International Population Conference since 2017, following the conversion of the 2021 conference planned in Hyderabad, India to a virtual conference. Over 1,300 participants from 98 countries, representing a variety of disciplines and career stages, registered to attend the conference, but due to last-minute budget cuts and travel restrictions, as well as difficulties getting visas, many registered participants were unable to attend in Brisbane. The on-site conference with 1,019 participants in Brisbane was none-the-less a great success. Positive feedback from participants highlighted the continuing central role of the IPC as the world's leading forum for population research and policy dialogue.

The scientific programme was extensive and diverse, including more than 950 oral presentations and 205 posters across 24 thematic areas of population research. Topics ranged from fertility, mortality, migration, and ageing to SRHR, gender dynamics, climate change, Indigenous populations, and innovations in demographic methods and data.

Key scientific and policy themes

Plenary sessions addressed urgent and cross-cutting demographic issues, including the global population data “emergency,” threats to SRHR, population resilience in the face of climate change and crises, and the role of demographic evidence in national planning. Across regular sessions and posters, research highlighted new evidence on demographic change alongside methodological innovations, including the use of satellite data, big data, and microsimulation.

Supporting global participation and early-career engagement

Ensuring broad global representation remained a priority. With support from partners and IUSSP resources, financial assistance enabled participation by 207 researchers who might otherwise have been unable to attend. IPC2025 also welcomed a large cohort of early-career scholars, strengthening global networks and contributing to capacity building within the discipline.

Looking ahead

The Conference concluded with awards and closing reflections, and with the announcement that the 31st International Population Conference will be held in Barcelona in 2029.

Governance

General Assembly

The IUSSP General Assembly was held virtually on 13 November 2025. Outgoing President Shireen Jejeebhoy reviewed achievements during her term, including strong scientific contributions made to the field by IUSSP Scientific Panels, the successful convening of IPC2025, expanded activities for early-career demographers, and receipt of the UN Population Award. Secretary General and Treasurer Nico van Nimwegen reported that IUSSP finances remain stable, with €2.1 million in reserves. Over the past four years, income slightly exceeded expenditure. However, reliance on grants and declining donor support posed significant future challenges. The Assembly also included discussion with members on future directions, visibility, engagement of younger members, and adapting to changes in the academic environment and communication channels.

Members approved the Secretary General’s report on activities and finances.

Elections and leadership transition

The 2025 Council and Committee on Nominations elections were held from 15 September to 27 October 2025 via online voting, overseen by an independent Election Committee. Over 57% of eligible IUSSP members voted. The newly elected 2026–2029 IUSSP Council will begin its mandate on 1 January 2026 with Laura Rodriguez Wong as President (2026–2029), Reiko Hayashi as Vice President and President-Elect (2030–2033), and Anne Goujon as Secretary General and Treasurer. Shireen Jejeebhoy was elected Honorary President and will chair the 2029 Committee on Nominations.

Scientific Activities

In 2025, IUSSP Scientific Panels continued to deliver a robust programme of seminars, workshops, lectures, and training activities. IUSSP activities included 1,479 participants, 500 of whom were from LMIC countries. The IUSSP Panel on Population Registers, Ethics and Human Rights and the IUSSP Standing Committee on Demographic Terminology also held monthly virtual meetings throughout the year.

IUSSP Special Projects

Several IUSSP Panels are leading donor-funded projects or working in collaboration with international organisations.

Rethinking Family Planning Measurement –Gates Foundation (2023–2026)

This project, led by the [Panel on Rethinking Family Planning Measurement with a Reproductive Justice and Rights Lens](#), brings together researchers, policymakers, and programme planners to critically assess global fertility and family planning indicators and improve how gaps in programmes are measured and communicated. In 2025, the Panel carried out a global consensus-building process including a global survey of FP measurement experts, a session at IPC2025, and a recommendations workshop at the International Conference on Family Planning (ICFP) in Bogotá. Their work resulted in a special issue in *Studies in Family Planning* on rights-, justice-, and person-centered measurement approaches. In 2026 they plan to disseminate the panel's recommendations.

Population Registers, Ethics and Human Rights – IDRC, Canada (2025–2027)

Supported by a new 2.5-year IDRC grant, this initiative addresses ethical and human rights challenges in modernising population register systems, with an expanded focus on SRHR and the climate crisis. The project is implemented by the [Panel on Population Registers, Ethics and Human Rights](#) in collaboration with senior researchers at the University of Southern California Institute on Inequalities Global health the Wits Institute for Social and Economic Research (WiSER, South Africa). The project includes mentoring of three early-career fellows.

Standing Committee on Demographic Terminology

Following recommendations of the IUSSP–CODATA Working Group on FAIR Vocabularies, IUSSP created a [Standing Committee](#) to oversee development and maintenance of a FAIR demographic vocabulary suited to the needs of population scientists, students, the providers of official statistics, other scientific domains, and the general public. Documentation will be published in both human and machine-readable forms to respond to emerging standards, such as FAIR (Findable, Accessible, Interoperable, Reusable). In 2025 it issued a request for proposals to identify technical partners, and circulated a call for experienced demographers to contribute to editing and updating the new multilingual Ontology of Demography.

N-IUSSP

[N-IUSSP](#) published 51 articles in 2025 and continues to disseminate scientific findings from demographic research conducted by IUSSP members and the wider population research community. Content is distributed to members weekly and is archived online.

Communications and Website

The IUSSP website is regularly updated with information on IUSSP activities, events, calls for papers, fellowships, jobs, publications, and member news. In 2025, IUSSP distributed 233 email announcements to members and produced four newsletters.

Web traffic continued to increase, with 110,000 users (including 103,000 new users) and 322,525 page views (up from 292,000 in 2024). The most visited pages included “What’s New”, the Home Page, the Membership Directory Profile, the Log-In page, and the International Population Conference page.

Social and video channels continued to support outreach and access to recordings. In 2025, IUSSP discontinued use of X and shifted communication to Bluesky. Videos from IUSSP activities are hosted on the IUSSP YouTube channel, which features 175 videos as of 2025.

Outreach to International and Regional Partners

IUSSP is a member of the International Science Council and also collaborates closely with UNFPA, the United Nations Population Division, and with the regional population associations for Africa, Asia, Europe and Latin America as well as national population associations such as PAA and the Australian and Indian population associations. Panels strengthened partnerships and contributed to international and regional events in 2025, including:

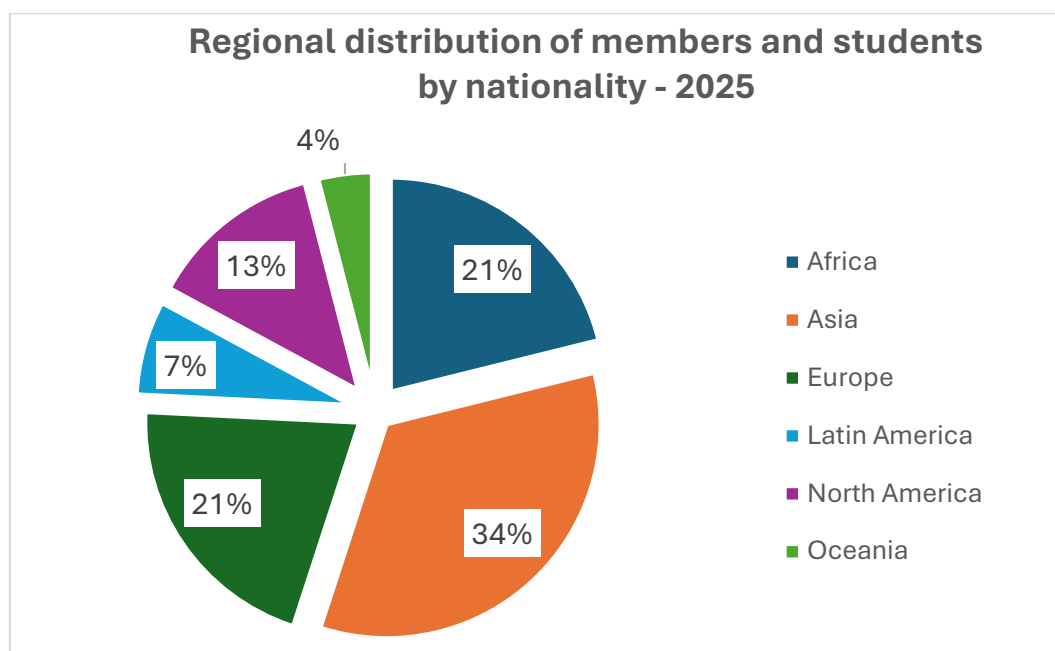

Institutional Affiliation

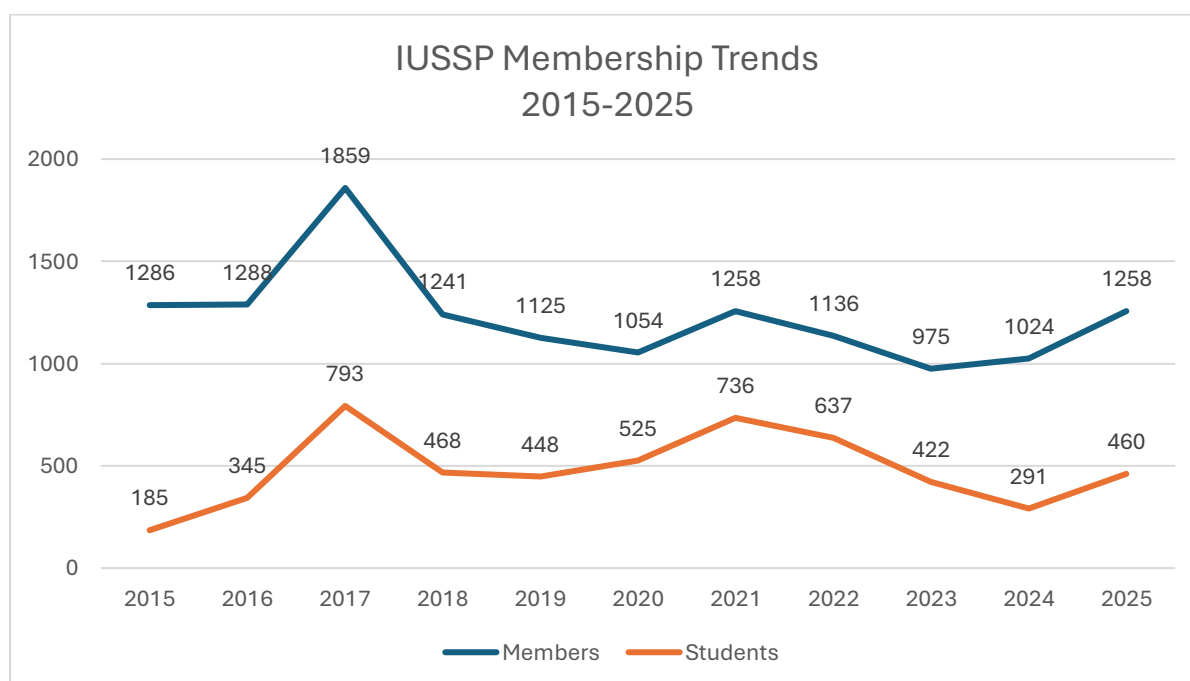
The Institutional Affiliation Programme, launched in 2024, continued to strengthen IUSSP’s network and sustainability. Dues are tiered by income level (€5,000 high-income; €2,500 middle-income; €1,000 low-income countries). The IUSSP held a meeting for the IUSSP Affiliated Institutions at the IPC2025 in Brisbane, Australia.

Membership

As of 31 December 2025, IUSSP had 1,258 full members and 460 student associates from 108 countries, representing 119 nationalities. In 2025, 196 new regular members and 231 new student associates joined the Union, and women comprised 45% of full members and 57% of student associates.



Membership increased in 2025, consistent with typical conference-year growth and renewed engagement around IPC2025.



Awards and Recognition

The IUSSP celebrated excellence within the field through awards recognizing senior, mid-career and early career members:

- **France Meslé** was elected the **35th IUSSP Laureate**, recognizing her exceptional contributions to IUSSP and population science.
- **KG Santhya** received the **IUSSP–Mattei Dogan Award for Comparative Research in Demography** and delivered a keynote lecture at IPC2025.
- The 2025 **Early Career Awards** recognized five emerging scholars, reinforcing IUSSP's commitment to nurturing the next generation of population scientists. The award is organized in collaboration with the regional population associations – Asian Population Association (APA), Latin-American Population Association (ALAP), European Association for Population Studies (EAPS), Population Association of America (PAA), and Union for African Population Studies (UAPS). The 2025 Early Career Awardees are **Diego Alburez-Gutierrez** (Europe), **Monica Alexander** (Northern America), **Nurudeen Alhassan** (Africa), **Igor Cavallini Johansen** (Latin America & the Caribbean) and **Luca Maria Pesando** (Asia-Pacific).

Management and Finances

In 2025, IUSSP income totaled €1,305,421, while expenditures amounted to €1,270,938, resulting in a positive balance of €34,483. The following summary is based on the IUSSP Statement of Activities and Changes in Net Assets for 2022–2025 (Annex 1).

Income

Grants:

IUSSP received €589,498 in grants from private foundations and governments to support scientific activities and operational costs in 2025. This amount includes €150,685 from a multi-year grant (2022-2025) from the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation to cover operational and other costs that ended in 2025. An additional €128,868 in tied funds from multi-year grants awarded in previous fiscal years was made available for scientific activities.

IPC Registration Fees, Membership Dues, Gifts, Investment Income, and Exchange Rate Gains:

The 30th International Population Conference organized in Brisbane, Australia generated €420,646 in registration fee income. IUSSP revenue also included

- €47,828 from 2025 membership dues
- €20,293 in gifts
- €1,681 in royalties and book sales
- €58,301 in investment income and interest from USD accounts at Banque Transatlantique
- €38,296 in exchange rate gains

In addition to direct financial contributions, IUSSP benefits from significant in-kind support provided by Panel members, volunteers, and their institutions. These contributions are not included in the financial accounts. The French National Institute for Demographic Studies (INED) also provided in-kind support valued at €25,516 in 2025.

Expenses

The IUSSP operating budget for 2025 totaled €1,270,938. Key expense categories included:

Scientific Activities:

Direct costs related to organizing the International Population Conference (IPC) amounted to €472,254. Costs included travel support to participants on the scientific programme from LMICs, travel costs of members of the International Organising Committee, and funds were used to cover the coffee breaks during the Conference for all participants.

IUSSP spent €107,173 on direct scientific and training activities (excluding staff time) related to the activities of the Population Registers, Ethics and Human Rights and Rethinking Family Planning Measurement projects. These initiatives were supported by grants from IDRC-Canada and the Gates Foundation. IUSSP also spent €24,508 on publications and website maintenance, including IUSSP's news magazine, N-IUSSP.

General Operations and Salaries:

- €294,328 for Secretariat salaries, taxes, and social security contributions
- €25,442 for accounting and auditing services
- €22,211 for office supplies, internet, bank fees, and other operational costs
- €3,588 under other financial and exceptional expenses for staff recruitment and training
- €1,097 for depreciation of assets

Governance:

IUSSP governance costs totaled €16,408, covering Council and Bureau meetings and outreach to regional associations.

Foreign Exchange and Investment-Related Costs:

The IUSSP experienced €178,934 in exchange rate losses on transactions in foreign currencies largely due to a fall in the value of the USD between February and May 2025, which impacted IUSSP's USD dollar accounts. This loss was offset by €38,296 in gains, resulting in a net loss of €140,638.

Tied Funds:

€124,996 was allocated from 2025 grant income as tied funds for future expenses related to the Rethinking Family Planning Measurement project, funded by the Gates Foundation and the Population Registers, Ethics and Human Rights project funded by IDRC-Canada.

Reserves

As of 1 January 2026, total IUSSP reserves stood at €2,151,333, including:

- €239,290 in general reserves
- €1,315,479 in project reserves earmarked for specific activities
- €596,564 set aside for contingencies

Investments

IUSSP maintains two capital investment accounts. One with Finaveo (life insurance), subscribed in 2010 at €500,000, had an estimated value of €679,140 at the end of 2025. The other is with Allianz, subscribed in July 2024 at €499,950, with an estimated value of €519,486 at the end of 2025.

Secretariat Headquarters

The IUSSP Secretariat is hosted by INED at the Campus Condorcet in Aubervilliers, just north of Paris. The Secretariat is staffed by three permanent employees who coordinate scientific activities and publications, communicate with members and donors, maintain the website, and manage fundraising and reporting. In addition, short-term consultants have supported project-related activities, and a temporary part-time staff member was hired to assist with preparations for IPC2025.

Auditor

The 2025 audited accounts were prepared by IUSSP's external accountant, Florence Reboul at 3A-FR, and verified by the auditing firm Forvis-Mazars, whose contract was renewed for a new term in 2025. Donors

In 2025, IUSSP received generous support from several governments, private foundations, and partner organizations, including:

- The French Institute for Demographic Studies (INED)
- UNFPA
- Birthcare Medical – China (to support the Chinese translation of *Tools for Demographic Estimation*)

In addition to financial support, INED continues to provide office space and services for the IUSSP Secretariat at an in-kind value of €25,516 in 2025. The IUSSP also gratefully acknowledges the generous contributions from individual members and the in-kind support from partner institutions.

Conclusion

In 2025, IUSSP combined global recognition with strong scientific output, successful delivery of IPC2025, active engagement by its Panels and committees, and a smooth governance transition toward the 2026–2029 Council. The year's achievements strengthen the Union's foundation as it approaches its centenary in 2028 and prepares to continue promoting rigorous population science, international exchange, capacity building, and evidence-informed policy dialogue worldwide.

The year was also marked by a challenging global funding environment for scientific research, including population research. Funding priorities continue to evolve, with many donors reducing support for population-related activities and an increasing share of resources being directed directly to institutions in the Global South. These changes present both challenges and opportunities for IUSSP. In the years ahead, the Union will need to adapt its financial model, strengthen and diversify its funding base, and continue demonstrating the unique value it brings as a global scientific association. While reserves may play a role in supporting this transition, IUSSP remains committed to ensuring its long-term financial sustainability and its capacity to serve the international population science community.
