

The logo artwork for International Population Conference 2025 was created by Aboriginal artist, Breanna 'Bree' Buttenshaw. The design incorporates the Brisbane River of Meanjin. The river, colloquially known as the 'brown snake', plays a key role in both the Turrbal and Jagera cultures of Meanjin. The conference logo also features a central meeting place and the footsteps of travellers from locations far and wide leading to the group of people meeting. The artist, Bree, is a Kalkadoon woman (an area in North West Queensland, incorporating Mount Isa) who now lives on Quandamooka Country (an area now known as Moreton Bay, on the Brisbane outskirts). When she isn't letting her artistic talents run wild through her design studio Little Butten, she is a fulltime teacher.


Opening Ceremony and Welcome Reception
