Their addition marks an important expansion of this long-standing international reference resource. • Farhat Yusuf (1940–2025)

Farhat Yusuf, long-time IUSSP member, died in Sydney, Australia on 14 October, aged 85. Born in 1940 in Delhi, in what was then British India, Farhat Yusuf first moved to Pakistan and then to Australia. He worked for Macquarie University for over 40 years, playing a major role in the development of its ground-breaking undergraduate program in Demography. IUSSP ELECTION PROCEDURES

The election was held from 15 September to 27 October 2025. The electoral list included all (full) members who were in good standing as of 15 August 2025. The elections were conducted via the Internet and all votes cast were automatically tabulated by Association Voting, a third-party internet company which provides online voting services to many associations.

The electoral procedure was controlled by an Election Committee composed of three IUSSP members appointed by the Council: Ankit Sikarwar [India], Jenny Garcia [France; Bolivia] and Adrien Remund [Switzerland].

Highlights from the 2025 IUSSP General Assembly

Zoom meeting, 13 November 2025

The IUSSP held its quadrennial **General Assembly** virtually on 13 November 2025, bringing 130 members together online to reflect on achievements from the past four years and to preview priorities for the next term. While the plenary portion allowed only limited time for discussion, members engaged more deeply during **breakout sessions with Scientific Panels**, which drew strong participation across themes and career stages.

Looking Back: Achievements and Challenges

Outgoing President **Shireen Jejeebhoy** opened the Assembly with **reflections** on a productive 4-year mandate marked by:

- A vibrant scientific programme with **24 active panels**, numerous seminars, webinars and training events, and special journal issues.
- A successful **IPC 2025 in Brisbane**, gathering 1,300 participants from nearly 100 countries.
- Receipt of the **2025 UN Population Award**—IUSSP became the proud winner of the 2025 United Nations Population Award, for the evidence we have generated, the capacity we have built, and the networks we have facilitated across the globe.
- Expanded support for early-career demographers, including a new Early Career Panel and the Early Career Awards.
- Growing collaboration with regional associations and the addition of new institutional members.

She also noted persistent challenges: shifting donor priorities, shrinking core funding, and increasingly restrictive academic environments.

Report on Activities and Finances

Secretary General Nico van Nimwegen summarized IUSSP's scientific activities, publications, training efforts, and partnerships. He highlighted:

- Continued strong engagement across 24 Scientific Panels, including two recently created.
- Receipt of the UN Population Award recognizing IUSSP's global leadership since 1928, promoting international collaborations and helping to build capacity in demography and population studies.
- Growth in institutional affiliation and stabilization of membership trends, even as professional association membership becomes less automatic for early-career scholars.
- High-quality outputs from IUSSP panels and special projects funded by the Gates Foundation and IDRC-Canada.

- The scientific strength and logistical success of IPC 2025, made possible through the work of reviewers, conveners, volunteers, and partners in Australia.
- A stable financial position with €2.1M in reserves, though future sustainability remains a concern given declining donor support.

Members approved the 2021–2024 activities and financial report-.

Breakout Sessions with Scientific Panels

Participants then joined "meet and greet" breakout rooms with ten Scientific Panels, covering topics from abortion research to migration, climate change, kinship, mortality, demographic terminology, reproductive justice, and early-career perspectives. These exchanges provided rich opportunities for members to learn about ongoing work and future plans.

A New Council and a New Quadrennium

Incoming President Laura Wong presented the 2026–2029 Council, the 2029 Committee on Nominations, and welcomed Shireen Jejeebhoy as Honorary President. She emphasized the importance of member engagement, the centrality of scientific panels, and preparations for IUSSP's 100th anniversary in 2028. She encouraged young demographers to propose new panel initiatives and help shape the Union's future.

Looking Ahead to IPC 2029 - Barcelona

Albert Esteve (IUSSP Council Member and Director of the Centre for Demographic Studies - CED) and **Mariona Lozano** (Research Fellow, CED) shared early plans for **IPC 2029**, to be held **23–27 July 2029** at Universitat Pompeu Fabra's Ciutadella campus in Barcelona, with hybrid options for large plenaries and an opening ceremony at a major cultural venue.

Tribute to France Meslé – IUSSP Laureate Ceremony 2025 INED, Aubervilliers/Paris, France & online, 7 October 2025

The Union honored France Meslé (Emeritus Researcher at the French National Institute for Demographic Studies - INED) with the 35th Laureate at a hybrid ceremony that took place on 7 October at INED in Aubervilliers, France. The ceremony gathered colleagues, students, family members, collaborators, and IUSSP leaders from around the world, in person and online, reflecting the breadth of France's influence on demography, her outstanding contributions to the advancement of population sciences and her distinguished service to the community of population scientists and IUSSP.

Tributes were delivered by: Magali Barbieri, Vladimir Shkolnikov, Giancarlo Camarda, Jenny Garcia, María Eugenia Cosío-Zavala, Géraldine Duthé, Pavel Grigoriev, Mary Ellen Zuppan, and Shireen Jejeebhoy, with many INED colleagues and international collaborators also in attendance.



The speakers painted a moving portrait of France Meslé:

- **Scientific Leadership:** France was praised as a pioneering figure in mortality and cause-of-death analysis, whose methodological innovations and international collaborations—particularly in Eastern Europe and the Human Mortality Database—have profoundly shaped the field.
- Builder of Networks: Her work has created lasting scientific communities across
 continents, uniting researchers around rigorous data work and comparative analysis.
- Exceptional Mentor: Colleagues and former students emphasized her rare balance of high expectations, intellectual clarity, encouragement, and genuine concern for students and colleagues—qualities that helped launch and sustain many careers.
- **Service to the IUSSP:** Her tenure as Secretary General and Treasurer was highlighted for strengthening the Union's activities, partnerships, and visibility, including the creation of N-IUSSP and enhanced collaboration with the United Nations.
- Warmth and Humility: Beyond her scholarly contributions, France was consistently described as modest, generous, open-minded, and deeply human—a colleague who builds community as she advances science showing the empathy and scientific rigor are not incompatible.



France's Reflections

In her closing remarks, France expressed gratitude and surprise at the honor, recalling key moments of her long association with the IUSSP and recognizing the colleagues, mentors, and loved ones who shaped her path. She underscored her belief that scientific progress is fundamentally collective, thanking INED and her many collaborators for the privilege of continuing to work and share ideas even in retirement.

UNFPA-India session congratulating IUSSP on receiving the 2025 UN Population Award at the IASP Annual Conference

Kolkata, India, 27–29 November 2025

At the 46th Annual Conference of the Indian Association for the Study of Population (IASP), held 27–29 November 2025 in Kolkata, India UNFPA India formally felicitated the International Union for the Scientific Study of Population (IUSSP) for receiving the **2025 United Nations Population Award (Institutional Category)**. The session, chaired by **Andrea M. Wojnar**, UNFPA India Representative and Country Director for Bhutan, highlighted IUSSP's long-standing contributions to advancing global population science, fostering collaboration across regions, and strengthening capacity for demographic research.

In her address, **Shireen Jejeebhoy**, IUSSP President (2022–2025), described the award as a powerful affirmation of IUSSP's leadership in generating rigorous evidence, building research capacity, and convening global networks. Reflecting on her own early career experience as an IUSSP seminar participant, she emphasized the organisation's commitment to academic excellence, egalitarian collaboration, and mentorship across generations. She also outlined key achievements from the last four years, including the work of 24 scientific panels, successful publication outputs, a highly attended International Population Conference (IPC) 2025 in Brisbane, and the strengthening of initiatives for early-career scholars and institutional partnerships.

Shireen Jejeebhoy also noted the growing challenges facing the population field—rising inequalities, below-replacement fertility in some regions and continuing high fertility in others, climate- and conflict-induced mobility, political instability, and threats to data quality and academic freedom. She highlighted the need for demographic research to go beyond traditional data systems, including digital data and artificial intelligence, and underscored the urgency of informed policy dialogue at a time of widespread demographic anxieties and misinformation.

Mary Ellen Zuppan, IUSSP Executive Director, highlighted the Union's core activities and opportunities for engagement. She outlined IUSSP's global membership and its scientific programme, driven by member-led panels addressing emerging population challenges. She also emphasized the Union's commitment to capacity strengthening through training, mentoring and online tools, as well as its dissemination platforms, including N-IUSSP, the Bulletin and IPC Working Papers. She encouraged IASP members to participate in upcoming calls for new panels and in preparations for the next International Population Conference in Barcelona in 2029, inviting members to stay engaged and contribute to the Union's vibrant community.

Panel Reflections: The Value of IUSSP's Scientific Community

A panel discussion moderated by Shireen Jejeebhoy brought together a group of IUSSP members in India: Krishnamurthi Srinivasan, Kajori Banerjee, K.G. Santhya, and Niranjan Saggurti. The speakers reflected on IUSSP's unique strengths:

- its unfiltered, uncensored space for scientific exchange;
- a deep commitment to data quality and methodological rigor;
- an egalitarian and supportive environment that nurtures junior demographers;
- the role of IUSSP activities in **inspiring lifelong engagement** with demography.

Panelists proposed future directions, including strengthening virtual activities to broaden accessibility, continued investment in scientific panels, and fresh initiatives for early-career researchers.

UNFPA Perspectives

Andrea Wojnar underscored the critical role of population scientists in addressing today's multidimensional challenges—from climate change to migration, aging, and equitable development. She encouraged demographers and institutions like IUSSP to deepen engagement with multidisciplinary forums, noting that complex demographic issues require integrated approaches.

UNFPA highlighted that India's demographic trajectory, including its large youth population, presents both opportunities and responsibilities. Evidence-based policies grounded in high-quality demographic data remain essential for ensuring inclusive and sustainable growth.

Closing Reflections

Participants echoed strong appreciation for IUSSP's global role, its scientific leadership, and its spirit of collegiality. The session closed with a call to sustain and strengthen support for the Union—intellectually, financially, and through broader partnerships—as it prepares to meet the evolving challenges and opportunities confronting the population field.

IUSSP at the 2025 International Conference on Family Planning (ICFP)

Bogotá, Colombia, 3-6 November 2025

The IUSSP was present at the International Conference on Family Planning (ICFP) that took place in Bogotá, Colombia November 3-6, 2025. This meeting provided an opportunity for IUSSP Council members and IUSSP members to engage with the global Family Planning community, especially the large contingent from Latin America. During the meeting, a diverse pool of IUSSP members volunteered at the IUSSP booth and engaged with ICFP participants about the benefits of participating in the Union. 61 people signed up to receive more information about the IUSSP.

The conference also provided an opportunity for the IUSSP Panel on Rethinking Family Planning Measurement with a Reproductive Justice and Rights Lens to engage with the global family planning community. This included presenting findings from a recent consensus-building exercise as part of an oral session on New Tools and Approaches for Measuring Family Planning and Reproductive Health.

The Panel also led a one-day post-conference recommendations workshop with about 30 invited participants representing researchers, practitioners, measurement experts, and donors from across the globe. The workshop was an opportunity through large and small group discussions to review and scrutinize lessons learned and recommendations for future family planning measurement. The recommendations from the workshop will be disseminated in 2026.

Announcing the Chinese Versions of the Online Multilingual Demographic Dictionaries

December 2025

The IUSSP is pleased to announce the release of the Chinese versions of the Online Multilingual Demographic Dictionaries, now accessible through the Demopaedia platform. Importantly, the project includes two Chinese variants—one for Mainland China (Simplified Chinese) and one for Taiwan (Traditional Chinese)—reflecting linguistic practice and terminology differences across Chinese-speaking regions. Their addition marks an important expansion of this long-standing international reference resource.

The printed versions can be ordered /purchased through Lulu.com, a "print-on-demand" service, using the links provided above. Additionally, you can download the PDF or EPUB versions of the dictionaries in Chinese as well as in other languages via the Demopaedia website for downloads. The Demopædia dictionaries, available both in web format and as printed books, are released under the Creative Commons ShareAlike license.

Why two Chinese editions?

The dictionary initially aimed for a single unified Chinese edition. However, traditional Chinese indexing relies on counting strokes, a method younger generations increasingly cannot perform because handwriting has declined sharply as people increasingly use computers and smartphones for communication. The team had to find more appropriate classification methods, but each proposed classification method is specific to the character variant, resulting in the need for two variants. (For more information on this, read "Why One Dictionary Became Two Books", by Nicolas Brouard.)

A Long-Standing Resource, Now Online and Expanded

The Multilingual Demographic Dictionaries were originally developed under the auspices of the United Nations and the IUSSP beginning in the 1950s. Their purpose was to establish a **standardized**, **multilingual vocabulary** of demographic concepts for use in research, teaching, and statistical reporting.

With the creation of **Demopaedia**, the dictionaries were transformed into an online, openly accessible, and evolving resource. Today, Demopaedia provides harmonized definitions, stable term identifiers, and a shared conceptual structure across multiple languages. The online environment allows the dictionaries to be consulted easily and updated over time while maintaining cross-linguistic coherence.

Languages Currently Available on Demopaedia

Demopaedia now hosts dictionary content in a broad set of languages, including Arabic, Chinese (Mainland), Chinese (Taiwan), Czech, English, French, German, Indonesian, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Malay, Nepali, Polish, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish, Thai, and Vietnamese.

Languages With a Unified Version of the 2nd Edition

The "unified" edition refers to a harmonized, structurally consistent version of the 2nd edition intended to serve as the basis for translation into multiple languages. At present, the unified format is fully available in **English and French**; it is used as the reference base for all subsequent translations, including the newly added Chinese versions. Other languages have been partially harmonized or are in progress.

Why the Online Dictionaries Matter for Demographers

In an international research environment where work routinely crosses linguistic and institutional boundaries, the online multilingual dictionaries serve several essential functions:

Conceptual precision and comparability

They provide authoritative definitions aligned with internationally accepted demographic practice, reducing ambiguity in teaching, research, and official statistics.

Support for multilingual collaboration

Harmonized terminology facilitates translation of teaching materials, survey instruments, technical documents, and research outputs across linguistic contexts.

• A didactic tool for students and non-specialists

The chapter structure and explanatory notes make the dictionaries more like a concise textbook of core demographic concepts.

A living resource

As a wiki-based platform, Demopaedia can evolve as demographic science evolves, allowing incremental updates while maintaining structural consistency.

The inclusion of the two Chinese variants significantly broadens the reach and usability of this shared terminology. It also supports the many researchers worldwide who engage with demographic data and scholarship from Chinese-speaking regions.

A Foundation for Interoperability and Machine-Readable Terminology

The structured, multilingual nature of the dictionaries provides a natural foundation for making demographic terminology FAIR—Findable, Accessible, Interoperable, and Reusable—by both humans and machines.

As part of a **new IUSSP initiative**, work is underway to explore how Demopaedia's stable identifiers, definitions, and translations can support:

- · Machine-readable demographic ontologies
- Metadata standards for censuses, surveys, and administrative sources
- Improved discovery and interoperability across demographic datasets
- Better performance of AI and NLP tools in handling demographic concepts

The availability of harmonized terminology across many languages—including the two Chinese variants—is essential for this vision. Machine-readable demographic vocabularies depend on a shared conceptual framework, and the Multilingual Demographic Dictionaries provide precisely such a foundation.

Looking Forward

The addition of the Chinese versions represents both a milestone and an opportunity. It expands access to this authoritative demographic lexicon, strengthens the global utility of Demopaedia, and supports the IUSSP's emerging work on FAIR and machine-actionable demographic terminology.

We encourage members to explore the Chinese dictionaries and to revisit the broader multilingual collection at **Demopaedia.org**. Your engagement and feedback will help guide the next stages of this evolving resource.



Farhat Yusuf (1940-2025)

Farhat Yusuf died in Sydney, Australia on 14th October 2025 aged 85. A long-time and active IUSSP member, he joined IUSSP in 1967. He chaired the IUSSP Scientific Panel on Business Demography (2007-2009).

Farhat Yusuf was born in 1940 in Delhi in what was then British India. Post-independence and partition, he moved with his parents to Pakistan. He was awarded a PhD in Demography by the Australian National University (ANU) in 1967. Following a period in Pakistan, in 1970 he returned to Australia to take up a Senior Lecturer position at Macquarie University in Sydney, He played a major role in the development of its ground-breaking undergraduate program in Demography. He worked at Macquarie



University for over 40 years, rising to the rank of Professor. After his retirement in 2011, he remained an active researcher. In 2015, he was honoured by the Government of Australia by being made a Member of the Order of Australia (AM).

Farhat co-authored four books. First published in 1974, *Demographic Techniques* (with then colleagues Alf Pollard and Geoff Pollard) became the textbook of choice for a generation of demographers around the world. *Consumer Demographics and Behaviour: Markets are People* (with Jo Martins and David Swanson), published in 2011, reflected his emerging interest in the field of Business Demography. Another fine introductory textbook (also with Martins and Swanson), *Methods of Demographic Analysis* was published in 2014.

Farhat authored a large number of solid data-based journal articles, both in Demography and in Public Health. His diverse range of research topics included family planning, fertility, biomedical demography, mortality, tobacco use and household expenditure. His obvious passion for research was sustained for over six decades, with his most recent paper appearing only shortly before his death in 2025.

In addition to his contributions to IUSSP, Farhat played a leading role in the development of the Australian Population Association (APA), especially in broadening its focus beyond the ANU. He was proud to claim to having been the APA's first National President. He was a driving force in the APA's New South Wales Regional Group for many years.

He acted as a consultant at various international organisations, including the UN Population Fund, the UN Development Programme, and the International Agency for Research on Cancer, and built extensive networks across government, business, and academia.

Farhat Yusuf is survived by his wife, two daughters, one son, four grandchildren and four greatgrandchildren. Sadly, the Demography Program at Macquarie University to which he devoted much energy has been discontinued. He leaves a substantial legacy of knowledge creation and mentorship and will be missed by friends and colleagues around the world.
