## **Report IUSSP Scientific Panel on Lifetime Migration (June 2025)**

The IUSSP Scientific Panel on Lifetime Migration (2023–2025), co-chaired by Aude Bernard (University of Queensland) and Sergi Vidal (CED-CERCA / Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona), aims to advance a life-course perspective in migration research. This approach moves beyond the binary classification of migrants and non-migrants, recognizing the complexity and recurrence of migration throughout individuals' lives. The Panel seeks to highlight the heterogeneity of migration behaviors, bridge internal and international migration as part of a continuum, and establish how migration trajectories shape individual life chances, social wellbeing, and inequality.

## **Training Activities**

The Panel has organized several well-attended training events focused on innovative methods to study migration over the life course. A hands-on workshop on "Mining Migration Trajectories with R" was held in January 2023 at the 3rd International Forum on Migration Statistics in Santiago, Chile. The session trained participants in techniques for extracting and analyzing migration sequences using the R programming language.

In June 2023, the Panel held a two-session <u>online training course on "Machine Learning Tools for the Analysis of Migration Trajectories"</u>. The course attracted a global audience and introduced researchers to sequence analysis and supervised classification approaches applied to migration data.

Looking ahead, the Panel will host a second "Mining Migration Trajectories with R" workshop as a side event to the International Population Conference (IPC) in Brisbane, Australia on 13 July 2025. This session has already drawn considerable interest, with around 80 participants registered.

## **Workshops and Scientific Sessions**

In March 2024, the Panel held a <u>webinar on "Innovations in Data Infrastructure for the Longitudinal Study of International Migration"</u>, which featured discussions on emerging data sources and their potential for enhancing migration research, with the participation of members of the IUSSP Panel on Priorities in International Migration Research.

In June 2024, the Panel organized an <u>Early-Career Researchers Workshop on Migration Over the Life Course</u> in Edinburgh, Scotland, as a full-day side event to the European Population Conference. The first part of the event provided a forum for junior scholars to present and refine their work through a peer review process. Six papers were selected for in-depth discussion. The second part of the workshop was a public session that drew over 40 attendees, where three ERC-projects – LIFELONGMOVE, FamilyTies, and MYMOVE – were introduced, which informed a subsequent discussion around future avenues of research in the field of life course migration.

The Panel also contributed two scientific sessions to the <u>50th British Society for Population Studies (BSPS) Annual Conference</u> held in September 2023 at Keele University, England. These sessions focused on the effects of childhood migration

experiences and the cumulative impact of mobility on individuals' well-being and labor market outcomes, highlighting the analytical value of a life-course perspective.

At the upcoming IPC 2025, in Brisbane, Australia the Panel will also organize a scientific session titled "Migration Across the Life Course", featuring five empirical studies that conceptualize migration as a sequence of experiences shaping and shaped by broader life trajectories and socio-historical contexts.

## **Publications**

In 2025, the Panel launched a <u>Call for Papers for a Special Issue</u> in *Comparative Population Studies* (CPoS), titled "Migration Trajectories Over the Life Course." The special issue, scheduled for publication in 2026, will bring together research applying longitudinal and trajectory-based approaches to migration. The call closed in May 2025 with a strong response—46 submissions were received—indicating the growing scholarly interest in this area.
