Overview of Activities

Between 2023 and 2025, the Panel actively advanced research and debate on the history and contemporary relevance of epidemics and contagious diseases. A major achievement during this period was securing EU funding through the COST Action *The Great Leap* (CA22116) – an international network dedicated to understanding historical mortality transitions – which has significantly strengthened our research capacity and collaborations (see www.greatleap.eu).

In short, the Panel strengthened its profile through a mix of virtual workshops, in-person seminars, and a major international conference. Topics of both historical and contemporary significance, such as cholera, tuberculosis, influenza, and inequalities in COVID, were addressed from diverse methodological and interdisciplinary perspectives. The Nijmegen conference served as a fitting culmination of the period, bringing together researchers worldwide, marking the completion of a major research project, and reaffirming the continuing relevance of historical epidemiological research. In addition, several publications based on the workshops are underway (such as a volume on cholera and a special issue in tuberculosis).
