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International Union for the Scientific Study of Population (IUSSP)

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Introduction

The International Union for the Scientific Study of Population (IUSSP), with over 2,246 members and 777 student associates from 141 countries on 31 December 2010, is the largest international professional association for individuals interested in population studies. The IUSSP is internationally recognized for its role in identifying emerging and critical population and development issues, encouraging scientific research on these topics, and sponsoring seminars, workshops, conferences, training sessions, and Internet forums at which critical issues can be discussed and debated.

The IUSSP's main goal "is to foster relations between persons engaged in the study of demography in all countries of the world, and stimulate interest in demographic matters among governments, national and international organisations, scientific bodies and the general public" (Article 1.2, IUSSP Constitution). The IUSSP achieves this goal through its scientific activities, publications, and advisory role in the international population field as well as through its members who include scholars, policy makers, and programme officials working in a wide range of disciplines and institutions concerned with population-related matters.

In 2010, a new Council took office setting priorities for 2010-2013. This was the first Council to be elected since the constitution was amended in 2005 and thus included members who were elected from regions as well as Council members elected-at-large. The role of Council members elected on a regional slate is no different from Council members elected-at-large, though it is hoped that regionally elected members will serve as a liaison with members in the regions alerting the Council to regional concerns and encouraging members in those regions to participate in IUSSP activities.

At its first Council meeting in January of 2010, the Council decided to build on the work of the previous Council. It supported several recent training initiatives established under the previous Council to improve the teaching of demographic methods and set up a Committee on Training to oversee those initiatives. A Website Committee was also established to consider refreshing the IUSSP website and improving IUSSP database systems

The IUSSP organized eight scientific activities in 2010: four seminars and workshops, an expert meeting, a training workshop and a cyber-seminar. Approximately 814 individuals directly participated in IUSSP scientific activities delivering 109 papers and communications (See Annex 2).

The IUSSP disseminates the scientific results of its activities through its website, in scholarly peer-reviewed journals and in the IUSSP-Springer series International Studies in Population (ISIP). In 2010, one edited volume was published in the ISIP collection and two special issues of a journal were devoted to papers from IUSSP seminars. In addition, three publications based on IUSSP activities were made available electronically via the IUSSP website. Seminar papers are made available to IUSSP members on the password-protected portion of the website and all seminar reports are available to the general public on the IUSSP website (www.iussp.org).

As part of plans to improve the website, a survey was conducted of all current and past members. The objectives of the survey were to evaluate member interest in potential new features for the IUSSP website, their overall use of the website and other member services and activities, and provide an opportunity for members to suggest ways to improve services. Members were particularly interested in an event calendar, news feed on population issues, and comprehensive search tool for the Membership Directory and, in general, more information to be provided on the website. The IUSSP contracted with a consultant to review IUSSP's current technical infrastructure, website, and databases, analyse current and future needs, and identify technical solutions for our website, membership database, and abstract submission software.

The IUSSP began planning for the XXVII IUSSP International Population Conference to be held in 2013. Korea was selected as the host of the 2013 Conference. The BEXCO Conference centre, a modern centre offering a large number of meeting rooms and auditoriums, in Busan, Korea will be the venue for the 27th Conference. In preparation for the first International Organization Committee meeting in early 2011, a request for session suggestions for the 2013 Conference was sent out to the IUSSP membership. IUSSP members sent 187 session proposal suggestions to be considered for the 2013 Conference scientific programme.

In 2010, 67 new members and 84 new student associates joined the IUSSP.

IUSSP Laureate Award

Each year the IUSSP honours one of its outstanding members by bestowing its Laureate Award. Outstanding contributions to the advancement of population science and distinguished service rendered to the IUSSP are taken into consideration in making this award. The 2010 IUSSP Laureate Award was presented to Richard A. Easterlin at a ceremony which took place during the Annual Meeting of the Population Association of America (PAA) in Dallas, Texas on 15 April 2010. Colleagues and former students spoke of Richard Easterlin's path-breaking contributions to the population sciences and the impact he has had on his students, many of whom have gone on to become leading demographers who continue to be influenced by his teaching and thinking. He has made important contributions to the study of long swings in population and the economy, determinants of health and mortality, and happiness. Richard Easterlin is currently University Professor and Professor of Economics at the University of Southern California. Scientific Meetings in 2010

One of the IUSSP's most important activities is the organization of scientific seminars and workshops where experts can discuss and debate research findings and programme initiatives. IUSSP seminars, conferences, and workshops advance knowledge on population issues and foster international and cross-disciplinary networks of scientists and policy makers working on critical population issues. Seminars and workshops are organized by IUSSP Scientific Panels and draw experts from a wide range of disciplines—demography, economics, sociology, epidemiology, medicine, history, anthropology, and statistics—thereby bringing diverse perspectives and approaches to a common problem. To encourage broad geographic participation in these seminars, the IUSSP may provide some travel subsidies to scholars from developing countries and elsewhere. IUSSP seminars contribute to the creation and strengthening of international networks of scholars and policy makers working on population issues.

Cyberseminar on "What are the Remote Sensing Data Needs of the Population-Environment Research Community?" 10-24 May 2010.

This cyberseminar was organized by the Population-Environment Research Network (PERN), and co-sponsored by the Group on Earth Observations (GEO) and the NASA Socioeconomic Data and Applications Center (SEDAC). Nine invited experts provided statements and approximately 570 researchers participated in the seminar. The discussion was structured around a set of 11 questions that sought to define the branches of population-environment research that use remote sensing data, their specific data needs, as well as barriers to using remote sensing data. The seminar ended with a discussion of how to build a broad consensus across the social science community on what remote sensing data is most needed. Workshop on The Revolution of Life Expectancy, Rostock, Germany, 12-14 May 2010.

This meeting was organized by the IUSSP Scientific Panel on Social and Biological Determinants of Longevity, and was held at the Max Planck Institute for Demographic Research (MPIDR), with financial support from MPIDR. The workshop brought together 19 participants, experts and observers, to consider the issue of why life expectancy started to rise in the 19th century. A total of 13 research papers were presented at the workshop. The papers included empirical research on historical populations, comparative studies, and methodological works. New and innovative methods were presented to visualize mortality change simultaneously over age and time and to measure the age of onset of mortality deceleration. Significant attention was given to the variability of human longevity and the impact of early-life events on later-life mortality. Discussion highlighted that in an analysis of trends of mortality over time it is relevant to include alternative measures of longevity to further understand the dynamic of longevity. Seminar on Demographics and Macroeconomic Performance, Paris, France, 4-5 June 2010.

The Population and Poverty Panel organized an expert meeting on 4 and 5 June 2010 in Paris. It was organized in collaboration with the Agence Française de Développement (AFD). The overall goal of the seminar, which brought together 30 participants, was to further interaction among researchers delving into the relationship between demographic change and macroeconomic performance. The nine papers presented at this meeting focused on those demographic variables and related concepts that are the most promising candidates for inclusion in macroeconomic modelling, in particular: Population size and its rate of growth,

Seminar on The family, the market or the State? Intergenerational economic support in an ageing society? Geneva, Switzerland, 23-24 June 2010.

This seminar was jointly organized by the IUSSP Scientific Panel on the Impacts of Population Ageing and AIDELF (an international association of French-speaking demographers) and took place in parallel with the 16th General Conference of AIDELF, devoted to the topic of "Intergenerational Relations: Demographic Issues" (21-24 June 2010). Of the four sessions of the IUSSP seminar, three appeared as parallel sessions of the AIDELF Conference, and one as a plenary. The seminar itself brought together a core group of 15 social scientists from Canada, Germany, Italy, Japan, Norway, Romania, Russia, Spain, Switzerland and the USA. The main focus of the seminar was on the changes that population ageing brings about, both at the macro and at the micro level, in such diverse fields as the labour market, pensions, and more generally the intergenerational transfer system, private exchanges between relatives (inter vivo gifts, bequests, etc.), capital accumulation, and also intergenerational relationships (e.g. co-residence, contacts, etc.). The policy implications and the possible actions that the ongoing demographic changes entail were explicitly considered, as well as the possibility of offsetting or reinforcing mechanisms on the interplay between the public and the private sphere. Although the geographic focus of the seminar was worldwide, special emphasis was placed on the consequences of ageing in developed countries, where ageing is more advanced, and where the role of immigration on the intergenerational system of exchanges needs to be analyzed in more report. programme depth. Training Workshop on Advanced Statistical Methods, Yaoundé, Cameroon, 25-31 October 2010.

This training workshop was organized by the IUSSP Scientific Panel on Strengthening Demographic Training in Francophone Africa, with the collaboration of the *Institut de formation et de recherche démographiques* (IFORD) and Cornell University (USA) and with funding from the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation. The purpose of this workshop was to provide a practical introduction to methods of decomposition and analysis of multilevel models. After a review of concepts, theoretical formulations and examples from literature, the 47 participants from Francophone Africa and the Maghreb were given the opportunity to apply these methods to the study of recent changes in Africa. They were divided into working groups according to their research topic: mortality/health, marriage, fertility, education/schooling, gender relations, environment and migration. These analyses were made using the Demographic and Health Survey (DHS) database specially prepared and paired with national statistics using STATA and SPSS. Seminar on Intergenerational Ties and Transitions to Adulthood, Milan, Italy, 8-9 November 2010.

This seminar was organized by Bocconi University, the MacArthur Network on Transitions to Adulthood and the IUSSP Scientific Panel on Transitions to Adulthood in Developed Countries. The seminar was attended by 27 participants mainly from Europe and North America. A total of 20 papers were presented. The seminar papers focused on the interplay between intergenerational ties and transitions to adulthood before, during, and after the early adult years employing historical, comparative and dynamic methods of analysis. The seminar examined factors such as social class and economic resources, immigration and diversity, and family processes and considered new methodological approaches to analyze transitions to adulthood. Seminar on the Health, Social and Economic Consequences of Unsafe Abortion, San Juan del Rio, Mexico, 10-12 November 2010.

This seminar was organized by the IUSSP Scientific Panel on Abortion, in collaboration with the Population Council's Mexico Office. The seminar was supported by funds provided by the IUSSP, and with additional external support from the Population Council (Mexico), Venture Strategies Innovations (VSI), the Bixby Center for Population Health and Sustainability, University of California, Berkeley and Venture Strategies for Health and Development (VSHD). The seminar's objective was to provide a forum for interaction between researchers working on the consequences of unsafe abortion, to critique and benefit from each other's knowledge and experience. The seminar brought together 34 participants from diverse backgrounds and regions. They included social scientists and statisticians (demographers, sociologists, epidemiologists and anthropologists), physicians and other providers involved in research and advocacy. There were seven special guests invited to participate as observers representing research organizations in Argentina, Guatemala, Colombia, Mexico, Uruguay and the United States. The 24 papers that were accepted for presentation at the seminar addressed issues that included: maternal mortality and morbidity resulting from abortion; the incidence of treatment of complications resulting from unsafe abortion in health facilities, trends over time and their relationship to the changing conditions of abortion service provision; women's perspectives on post-abortion care in India; the economic cost of unsafe abortion, including cost to health systems and households, and the relative cost of safe abortion procedures; the social cost of unsafe abortion, with a particular focus on measurement of stigma; and policies and programs to meet existing needs for post-abortion care and for reducing unsafe abortion. Seminar on Youth Migration and Transitions to Adulthood in Developing Countries, Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, 8-10 December 2010

This seminar was organized by the IUSSP Scientific Panel on Adolescent Life Course in Developing Countries, in collaboration with the Instituto Brasileiro de Geografia e Estatística (IBGE) and the Centre for Demographic, Urban and Environmental Studies (CEDUA), El Colegio de México. The seminar was supported by funds provided by the IUSSP and UNFPA. The goal of the seminar was to examine the evolving patterns and processes of youth migration and their consequences for the various transitions to adulthood of adolescents in developing countries. The seminar brought together 35 participants representing different disciplines sociology and demography, as well as anthropology, economics, and public health - and came from all the main world regions, including six local participants from Brazil. Themes presented at the seminar were grouped into four main areas: macro-level changes and impacts on sending and receiving communities; empowerment and vulnerability; influences on the decision to migrate; and migration in the context of the transition to adulthood. The 23 papers accepted for presentation at the seminar addressed issues such as the determinants of adolescent migration, how migration influences empowerment and vulnerability, the impact of migration on the transition to adulthood, and the role of gender in migration. Throughout the seminar, substantial time was set aside for the discussion of the policy implications of these papers, both in the specific countries discussed and for youth migration more generally. Training Activities in 2010

In addition to continuing a policy of providing support for graduate students and junior demographers to attend IUSSP Conferences and Seminars, the Council considered other initiatives to improve the state of demographic training, particularly in developing countries. In collaboration with UNFPA, the IUSSP is sponsoring the development of two sets of distancebased training materials for use as teaching tools by professors and for self-study by students and professionals needing to apply and understand demographic methods. The first set of Open and Distance Learning (ODL) materials will focus on Demographic Estimation from Limited and Defective Data and the second set will provide the equivalent of 130 hours of classroom training on Population Analysis for Policies and Programmes. In June 2010, a contract was signed with a consortium based at the University of Cape Town, South Africa, which includes individuals from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and Harvard University to develop web-based training materials for Demographic Estimation with Limited and Defective Data. Their proposal was selected from four proposals submitted in response to the Call for Tender. Materials should be ready for use by the end of 2011. The project to create a second set of distance-based training materials on Population Analysis for Policies and Programmes was lanced in 2010 with a Call for Tender that received four strong proposals. The successful bid will be announced in early 2011.

The IUSSP Scientific Panel on Strengthening Demographic Training in Francophone Africa supported by a grant from the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation is also focused on training. They conducted a survey of training needs of Francophone institutions in the region as well as the individual needs of students and demographers via a web survey. Following their analysis they decided to organize a week long training workshops on advanced statistical methods that were currently not taught in the region. The purpose of this workshop was to provide a practical introduction to methods of decomposition and analysis of multilevel models to teachers and researchers in the region. These advanced methods are particularly relevant to rigorous policy understanding of demographic change, its consequences, and the impacts of policy on demographic processes. The training philosophy, consistent with the project's goals, was to combine theory and practice, but also to reach a wide constituency that would disseminate the skills gained.

Junior Demographer Travel Awards

The IUSSP provides travel awards to Junior Demographers – doctoral students, post-doctoral students and professionals who finished their PhD in the last five years – generally from developing countries to attend IUSSP scientific seminars and conferences. The Awards further training and help young scholars develop professional networks. The Junior Demographer Award provides travel and per diem for a junior researcher to participate as an observer or present a paper or poster at IUSSP scientific meetings and conferences. In 2010 the IUSSP provided three Junior Demographer Travel Awards. In addition many participants presenting papers at IUSSP meetings were junior scholars and recent PhD's.

Publications

The IUSSP disseminates scientific papers through its website and publications. Nearly all papers presented at IUSSP seminars are available to the membership shortly after a seminar on the members-only password protected section of the IUSSP website. The best papers from IUSSP seminars are published in edited volumes and peer-reviewed journals. In 2010, one edited volume was published in the IUSSP-Springer collection International Studies in Population (ISIP) and two special issues of a journal were devoted to papers from IUSSP seminars. In addition, three publications based on IUSSP activities were made available electronically via the IUSSP website, including an IUSSP Policy and Research Paper (#22), which was translated into Spanish.

Management and Finances

In 2010, the IUSSP operating budget exceeded IUSSP income by 55,031 €. This was due to the addition of several new projects for which the Council authorized the use of reserve funds and 2010 expenses related to the 2009 International Population Conference in Marrakech. The IUSSP thus drew on special reserve funds to cover these activities.

The IUSSP operating budget for 2010 was $855,569 \in$. Expenses include: $151,689 \in$ to directly support IUSSP scientific activities; $44,215 \notin$ for publications and the IUSSP website; $317,399 \notin$ spent on salary costs; $50,387 \notin$ to pay for accounting and auditing services, office furnishing and supplies, depreciation on assets and other office expenditures; $34,235 \notin$ to cover expenses for IUSSP Council and Bureau meetings; and $3,870 \notin$ to cover membership subsidies for low-income country members. Additional tied funds from donors for scientific activities, amounting to $206,670 \notin$ are dedicated for the expenses of scientific activities occurring in 2011. The IUSSP also incurred $47,104 \notin$ in exchange rate and exceptional losses.

In 2010, IUSSP income totaled 800,538 €. Income sources include grants from private foundations and governments to support scientific activities and operational costs, membership dues, and income from interest earned on investments and exchange rate gains. In addition to the direct support the IUSSP receives from donors and institutions for operations and scientific activities, the IUSSP leverages additional funds through IUSSP Panel members and their

institutions. In 2010 institutions collaborating with the IUSSP reported leveraging over $50,000 \notin$, in direct financial support from other donors for IUSSP sponsored activities, which do not appear in our accounts but give an additional indication of the scope of our activities. This leveraged support does not include individual participants' travel expenses and, last but definitely not least, the valuable time donated by the many individuals involved in the organization of IUSSP activities.

As of 1 January 2011, IUSSP reserves stand at $1,749,654 \in$, of which $563,463 \in$ are held in general reserves, $243,883 \in$ are in a reserve for contingencies, and $942,308 \in$ have been set aside in special project reserves. The special project reserves include funds set aside for the 2013 International Population Conference ($492,962 \in$), the 2013 IUSSP General Assembly ($30,000 \in$), IUSSP Policy and Research Papers ($43,134 \in$), a Teaching Materials Project ($10,000 \in$), Scientific Activities ($93,543 \in$), Technological Innovations ($247,669 \in$) and US 501(c)(3) Status ($25,000 \in$).


IUSSP assets are held in several secure investments. At the end of 2010, $500,000 \in$ was placed in capital investments with Finaveo Capi. The rest is held in a secure tax-free money market account in Euros at Banque Transatlantique. The IUSSP also has interest bearing accounts in US dollars with Banque Transatlantique and with Tompkins County Trust Bank in New York, USA.

The Secretariat currently has five permanent staff members who coordinate IUSSP scientific activities and publications, communicate with IUSSP members, donors and the public, maintain a website, and coordinate fundraising and reporting to IUSSP donors.

The IUSSP 2010 audited accounts were prepared by the accounting firm ARICE and approved by auditors Mazars & Guérard. For further details on IUSSP revenue and expenses in 2010 see the Statement of Activities and Change in Net Assets for the Year Ended 31 December 2010 below. Comparable data for 2007-2010 are shown in that statement. The Statement of Financial Position as of 31 December 2010 shows IUSSP total assets and liabilities for the period 2007-2010. In compliance with article D.441-4 of the French *Code du Commerce*, a table showing the balance of debts to suppliers for 2010 can be found on page 18.


