### PROFILE SUMMARY OF LATIFAT D. G. IBISOMI, PhD

I hold a PhD in Demography and Population Studies, MSc (Med) in Epidemiology & Biostatistics, MSc in Population Studies, and a BSc (Hons) in Statistics. I also hold certifications in many specialized population, health, development, and management training programmes. Since 1988, I have pursued a career in the population and public health fields and thus have considerable experience on issues in the two fields, especially in sub-Saharan Africa (having lived and worked in the Western, Eastern and Southern regions of the continent). I am currently an Associate Professor and Head of the Epidemiology & Biostatistics division at the School of Public Health, University of the Witwatersrand (Wits), Adjunct Research Fellow of the Nigerian Institute of Medical Research (NIMR), a member of the Global Accrediting Body (GAB) for the Training Programs in Epidemiology and Public Health Interventions Network (TEPHINET), a member of the research committee of the Ekurhuleni Health District, Gauteng Province, South Africa, and a Director at the BAMMISHO Health and Demographic Surveillance node in Rustenburg, South Africa. I am an adviser on the WHO's TDR Implementation Research core competency framework and in the development of online Implementation Research course content. In addition, I am a member of the Global Advisory Group for the National Institute of Health and Care Research project (NIHR156363) on Nurturing the resilience of mobile youth to navigate health and wellbeing crises in Southern Africa from 2024 to date. Prior to my current employment, I worked in government, international and research institutions (including the National Population Commission, Nigeria; UNICEF, Nigeria; the African Population and Health Research Centre (APHRC), Kenya), and the Wits Graduate Programme in Demography and Population Studies.

My research focus is on promoting the sexual and reproductive health (SRH), and wellbeing of the African populations, particularly, the maternal, newborn and child health (MNCH) continuum using both quantitative and qualitative methodologies. My work is notable in adolescent, maternal & child health issues (including menstrual management, family planning, gender-based violence, unsafe abortion, preconception care, antenatal, delivery including management of basic emergency obstetric and newborn care complications, post-natal care, vaccination, breastfeeding, diarrhea and other childhood morbidities and mortality) and HIV; evaluation of the continental SRHR framework in nine African Countries; and the assessment of policy and systems frameworks for the bidirectional linkage of SRH and HIV in Kenya and Lesotho. I was a member of the task force on the ENGAGE<sup>1</sup> project, which sought to reposition family planning in Kenya. I was involved in the study on HIV incidence and related sexual behaviour practices among pregnant women at Chris Hani Baragwanath Hospital, Johannesburg; co-investigated a migration, urbanization, and health project at the Agincourt HDSS; and co-investigated as well as provided leadership for the needs assessment, baseline, mid-term, and summative evaluations as well as provided technical oversight, on a SRHR-HIV project focusing on

adolescents and young people, sex workers and migrants in six southern Africa countries. I have published 69 peer-reviewed, eight conference reviewed, and nine other non-peer reviewed papers, while six others are under review for publication. I have over 80 oral and posters presentations at local and international conferences/forums. I was a recipient of the Faculty of Health Sciences, University of the Witwatersrand's award for dedication and achievement in research in 2016 and 2018.

My research has contributed to the quantification and understanding of fertility preferences and behaviour; child health; socio-economic and cultural determinants of contraceptive behaviour; youth and adolescent's reproductive health; linkage between HIV and SRH, SRH access and services for migrants; evaluation of SRH initiatives, sexual health of older adults and demographic dynamics. Since 2015, I have been contributing increasingly to implementation and quality improvement sciences curriculum development, teaching, and research. I have also been involved in the application of implementation and quality improvement science methodologies to a broad range of health research. My future research interest is in applying implementation and quality improvement sciences to SRH research.

I teach and coordinate a broad range of courses, including Epidemiology, Biostatistics, Computing, Research Methodologies, and curriculum development as well as programme reviews of both undergraduate and graduate programmes at Departmental, School and Faculty levels. I have supervised four PhD, 43 master's and one honours research students to completion, and I am currently supervising nine master's and two PhD students. I have served as examiner for 10 PhD theses and 22 master's research work. I also served as the external examiner for the Master's in Public Health degree's core examination on Epidemiology & Biostatistics at the University of Pretoria, South Africa from 2019 - 2024. In addition, I mentor and coach past and current students, junior faculty, and other associates on academic and professional development issues. I am the principal investigator for an ongoing WHO/TDR post-graduate (MSc & PhD) training grants in Implementation Science. This grant and the SRHR-HIV funding in six Southern Africa countries, have funded 66 students (fully funded 58 MSc and four PhDs and provided partial funding for three MSc and one PhD students). The TDR grant also funded a professional development course in Project Management for more than 250 students and staff of the Wits School of Public Health between 2016 and 2024.

I serve/have served on numerous interview panels and on a number of Committees at various times at the Wits School of Public Health and Faculty of Health Sciences including Teaching and Learning, Transformation, Postgraduate Students' Research, Bachelor of Health Sciences, Re-admission, Plagiarism, ICT, Library, Career Development and Staffing & Promotion Committees. I am a member of six professional associations, an editorial board member of a Journal, an editorial advisory board member for another,

Associate Editor for one, and reviewer for twelve others. I have convened sessions at conferences, participated in reviewing conference submissions, book chapters and grant applications for various organisations. I have also chaired and been discussant at several local and international conferences. At the community level, I have been a volunteer with the Wits Hospice since 2013.

My broad academic qualifications, backed by my rich blend of field, research, classroom and management experiences, have been particularly useful in my lectures and other interactions with students. My training has provided me with tools that I apply in the conduct, analysis, and supervision of research work. My coordination; supervision, mentoring, coaching and facilitation; resource management; as well as representation and networking skills, have also been handy in the discharge of my many varied and growing administrative and managerial responsibilities.

The course was designed to bridge the skills gap in Demography and Population Studies in South Africa taking congnisance of the preferred part time studying model of the population. The course comprised four units spread across one calendar year (Unit 1: Introduction to Demography and Population Studies; Unit 2: Basic Demographic, Monitoring and Evaluation Methods; Unit 3: Basic social science research methods, and Unit 4: Population, Development and Policy Analysis)
- leading and facilitating a multi-stakeholder curriculum development workshop for the DPS Programme in August 2011. As a result of the workshop, I was involved in designing a new module on Social Statistics for Demographic Survey and Analysis to address the statistics and research methodology needs of DPS students
