Masters Research Abstract

Background: Children with severe illnesses and disability are often left in the cold out-side the functional governing social welfare systems and this escalates the unmet need of this population. There is less focus on the social and health wellbeing of this subset population which is influenced by the lack of integrated, effective and inclusive policies in the social welfare systems. The barriers and disparities are widening, this is influenced by inadequate disability mainstreaming. This study describes the accessibility to social welfare services such as health, education, and social services, in the comparison between two subset populations. The aim of this study is to reinforce the importance of establishing and implementing effective inclusive policies and disability mainstreaming in all government social welfare systems. Research design and methods: The data was extracted from NIDS Wave 4, the children and two weighted questionnaires, were merged using the unique household identifier. The stratified sampling was used, and sample size

(n) was 13047 this consisted of strata one children with severe illness or disability 562(n) and strata two children with no form of disability 12485 (n). The Pearson Chi2 (was used to test for significance between independent variables such as demographic, health and education in relation to the dependent variables such as severely ill or disability in children and no disability in children, analyzed using STATA version 14 under P< 0.05. Results: There was a high prevalence rate of disability and severe illnesses in children under 17 years of age which

accounted for 5.2% under Odds Ratio between [4.413, 6.138] and a statistical significance was found between health, demographics, social and education indicators in association with the epidemics. Conclusion and Policy implications: The findings of this study suggest that there is a need for the implementation of effective inclusive policies in social welfare systems to achieve inclusive development and disability mainstreaming in alignment with SDGs vision 2030 and Africa agenda 2063 to meet the unmet needs of children with disabilities and severe illness and to create a positive and sustainable livelihood in the principle of leaving

no one behind.
